

To all and every our Right Worshipful & loving Bethren we, Thomas Noward, Earl of Effingham, Lord Noward, Ea, go, Adding Liand Master under the authority of His Royal Mighney Henry Frederick Duke of Cumberland go, go, go, Lrand Master of the Most Ancient and Honorable Society of Free and Accepted Masons, sends greeting:

Know Te, that we, at the humble petition of our right trusty and well beloved Brethren Brince Hall, Boston Smith, Thomas Sanderson and several other Brethren residing in Boston, New England in North America do hereby constitute the said Brethren into a regular Lodge of Free and accepted Masons, under the site or denomination of the african Lodge, to be opened in Boston aforesaid, and do further at their said petition, hereby appoint the said Prince Hall to be Master Boston Smith, Senior Warden, and Thomas Sanderson, Junior Warden, for opening the said Lodge, and for such further time only as shall be thought proper by the trethren thereof, it being our will that this our appointment of the above officers shall in no wise affect any future election of officers of the Lodge, but that such election shall be regulated agreeable to such by laws of said Lodge as shall be consistent with the general laws of the society, contained in the Book of Constitution; and we hereby will and require you, the said Prince Hall, to take special care that all and every the said Brethren are or have been regularly made Masons, and that they do observe, perform, and keep all the rules and orders contained in the Book of Consti tutions; and further, that you do, from time to time, cause to be entered in a book kept for that purpose, an account of your proceedings in the Ledge, together with all such sules, orders and regulations, as shall be made for the good government of the same, that in nowise you omit once in every year to send to us, or our successors, Grand Masters, or to Rowland Holt, Esq., our Deputy Grand Master, for the time being an account in writing of your said proceedings, and copies of all such rules, orders, and regulations as shall be made as aforesaid, together with a list of the members of the Lodge, and such a sum of money as may suit the circumstances of the Lodge and reasonably be expected, toward the Grand Charity. Moreover, we hereby will and require you, the said Prince Hall, as soon as conveniently may be, to send an account in writing of what may be done by virtue of these presents.



Perhaps the most powerful and influential black American of his time, Frederick Douglass (1818-1895) embodied the tumultuous social changes that transformed the United States during the nineteenth century. In a career of unprecedented breadth, Douglass rose from the oppression of his slave birth to become an internationally famous writer and orator, one of the most visible spokesmen for the Abolition

movement before the Civil War and a key player in the political intrigues that followed the enfranchisement of the emancipated slaves after the Confederate surrender. An effective molder of public opinion, Douglass was a tireless lecturer and essayist and the editor of a succession of periodicals that solidified his renown while contributing significantly to the public discourse on a variety of issues. Former slave, impassioned abolitionist, brilliant writer, newspaper editor and eloquent orator whose speeches fired the abolitionist cause, Douglass led and astounding life. Physical abuse, deprivation and tragedy plagued his early years, yet through sheer force of character, he was able to overcome those obstacles to become a leading spokesman for our people.\*

The whole history of progress of human liberty shows that all concessions yet made have been born of earnest struggle.


If there is no struggle there is no progress. Those who profess to favor freedom, and yet depreciate agitation, are men who want crops without plowing up the ground. They want rain without thunder and lightning. They want the ocean without the awful roar of its many waters. This struggle may be a moral one, or it may be a physical one, and it may be both moral and physical; but it must be a struggle.

Power concedes nothing without demand. It never did and it never will.

Find out just what any people will quietly submit to, and you have found out the exact measure of injustice and wrong which will be imposed upon them; and these will continue until they are resisted with either words or with blows, or with both. The limits of tyrants are prescribed by the endurance of those whom they oppress. Men may not get all they pay for in this world; but they must certainly pay for all they get. If we are ever to get free from the oppressions and the wrongs heaped upon us, we must pay for their removal. We must do this by labor, by suffering, by sacrifice, and if needs be, by our lives and the lives of others.

Therefore, STRUGGLE WE WILL!




